



FOCUS ON PEACE

In today's world there are very few places set aside where "peace" is given a space for growth. Like the seeds of a flower, unless they find fertile soil it is very unlikely that they will grow to a beautiful flower.

The environment we provide for our children to grow in is what will decide the future of the world's social environment; if we fill it with violence, fear, greed and conflict their future will likely contain the same.

The time has come for us to **"Focus on Peace"**.

fo·cus NOUN:

1. The distinctness or clarity of an image rendered by an optical system.
 - a. The state of maximum distinctness or clarity of such an image.
 - b. An apparatus used to adjust the focal length of an optical system in order to make an image distinct or clear.
2. **A center of interest or activity.**
3. **Close or narrow attention; concentration**
4. **A condition in which something can be clearly apprehended or perceived**

The "Focus on Peace" Program encourages parents and teachers to bring "peace" into their children's lives.

This can be done by creating peace spaces at home and in class rooms.

(A peace space is a location dedicated to the concept of peace. It can have writings by peace people, peace art, meditation area, music, photography...)

These become the places where we begin to define peace to ourselves. On a larger scale this is what peace museums do for their visitors. We need to bring peace back into our lives.

Special activities that "focus" on peace can be made a part of home and school activities.

Such as:

- Peace dress days. Wearing something to remind yourself and others about peace issues.
- Cooperative games playing and activities, which show how our world gets better when we help others.
There are two video games, “A Force More Powerful” & “PeaceMaker” that challenge the players to make social and political changes using the tools of nonviolence.
- Peace art and creativity projects. Using peace as the theme create new artistic expressions that will bring peace into all forms of the arts.
- Create a peace periodical that reports on the good things happening around us.
- Peace film festivals

*let students come up with their own peace ideas.

Then we share our ideas of peace with others.

The internet provides an excellent tool for communication and has made our world seem a lot smaller. Through the internet children from various countries will have the opportunity to share their peace ideas with other young people.

Using art, writing, photography, video... young people will get a chance to express their ideas and experience the peace ideas of others.

We hope to have classrooms of different countries connected together for email and video exchanges so students and teachers can learn more about each other's cultures on a personal level.

The “Focus on Peace” program in India is a cooperative effort with the LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL, District 323 A2, India and the Dayton International Peace Museum.
